Venue - QT Hotel Gold Coast

What the venue has to offer and the ability to make a reservation, is available on the Congress website. When booking, please mention that you are attending the World Rett Syndrome Congress as a **discounted room fee** applies to attendees.

Climate

Spring (September to November) on the Gold Coast offers sunny days with mild tropical evenings. September can sometimes be windy, making it great for sports such as kite-surfing, kite-boarding, windsurfing and sailing. The temperatures range from 15-25°C (59-77°F).

Entering Australia

A visa is required by all persons entering Australia who do not have a current Australian passport. Please click on https://immi.homeaffairs.gov.au/visas/getting-a-visa/visa-finder/visit for guidance on how to apply for a visa. Processing times vary according to visa type so it is best to apply well in advance.

Travelling to, from and around the Gold Coast

The Gold Coast area is serviced by 2 different airports.

Gold Coast Airport https://www.goldcoastairport.com.au/ Situated in Coolangatta, the airport is a 30 minute drive from Surfers Paradise where the Congress venue is located. Direct airlines are Qantas, Jetstar, Virgin Australia, Air New Zealand, Air Asia, Tiger Airways and Scoot. Please note that the standard arrangement for disembarking and boarding is stairs onto the tarmac, so if such access is inappropriate, your airline would need to be contacted.

Brisbane International Airport and Brisbane Domestic Airport https://www.airport-brisbane.com/
Each airport has its own terminal but they are a kilometre apart. The time taken to drive from this part of Brisbane to Surfers Paradise would be 60 to 75 minutes depending on the amount of traffic.

A train service (Airtrain) https://www.airtrain.com.au/
is the fastest way to the Gold Coast.

Once on the Gold Coast

Helensvale station on the Gold Coast is where you alight from the Airtrain to transfer to the light rail service G:Link https://ridetheg.com.au/ which goes to Surfers Paradise and runs straight past the QT Hotel.

Information about these and additional means of transport (taxi, bus, etc.) to and from either airport will be available on the World Congress website shortly.

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Call for abstracts

The 'Call for abstracts' will open on 1 March this year via the Congress website and will close on 30 April. Notification to authors is to be completed by 30 June 2020.

Congress registration fees

Attendance at the World Rett Syndrome Congress requires an individual (excluding children aged under 15 years and persons with Rett syndrome or Rett-like disorder), to pay a registration fee, the purpose of which is to assist the Rett Syndrome Association of Australia (RSAA) to finance the event. The registration form, together with information on its submission and payment of fees, will be available on the Congress website in due course. The following table shows the registration fees (in Australian dollars) that will be apply. The fees include attendance at the cocktail reception which is to be held on the evening of 30 September (Congress Day 1).

Congress programme
